Praying our Summer Away...



This summer, let's pray for one another and celebrate our faith community. Do you remember the old school assignment: "Write a paper on how you spent your summer vacation." Summer is a good time to pull back, rest, reflect, pray and enjoy life; but often life doesn't go as we planned it.

Pastor Ben Patterson tells of a time when he was diagnosed as two herniated discs in his lower back. The prescription for recovery was total bed rest. Here's how Patterson describes it: "I was frustrated and humiliated. I couldn't preach, I couldn't lead meetings, I couldn't call on new prospects for the church. I couldn't do anything but pray. Not that I immediately grasped that last fact. It took two weeks for me to get so bored that I finally asked my wife for the church directory so I could at least do something, even if it was only pray for the people of my congregation. Note: it wasn't piety but boredom and frustration that drove me to pray. But pray I did, every day for every person in my church, two or three hours a day. After a while, the time became sweet. Toward the end of my convalescence, anticipating my return to work, I prayed, "Lord, this has been good, this praying. It's too bad I don't have time to do this when I'm working." And God spoke to me, very clearly. He said,



"Stupid (that's right, that was his very word. He said it in a kind tone of voice, though). You have the same 24 hours each day when you're weak as when you're strong. The only difference is that when you're strong you think you're in charge. When you're weak you know you aren't." That's when I began to understand that God loves the little things, the secret things his servants do, because when we stop being lords, he can be Lord of his church. And when he is Lord, there is power, and there is fruit. The good fruit visible in the church is planted in prayers prayed in weakness and in secret..."



This summer let's pray for one another... As you pray for Emmanuel:

Notes from the Organ Bench (David Enoch)

"I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" by Timothy Dwight From the Book "Then Sings my Soul Book 2" by Robert J. Morgan

"If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget its skill! If I do not remember you, let my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth—if I do not exalt Jerusalem above my chief joy." ~ Psalm 137:5



Those of us praying for a spiritual revival in America should remember the last two decades of the 1700's. It was a low-water mark for morality, especially on college campuses. The Rationalist movement sweeping over classroom and dormitory, had turned most professors and students into infidels.

"During the last decade of the 18th century," wrote J. Edwin Orr, "the typical Harvard student was atheist. Students at Williams College conducted a mock celebration of Holy Communion. When the Dean at Princeton opened the

chapel Bible to read, a pack of playing cards fell out, some radical having cut a rectangle out of each page to fit the pack! Christians were so unpopular they met in secret and kept their minutes in code."

Yale University in Hartford, Connecticut, was no exception. The college church was almost extinct, and Christian students—if there were any—were underground. But God was preparing a man named Timothy Dwight (grandson of Jonathan Edwards) to turn the tide.

As a child, Timothy had been precocious. He learned the alphabet in one lesson and read the Bible at an early age. Once when he didn't show up for dinner, his worried parents found him in the orchard teaching the catechism to a group of Native Americans. He was only four!

Timothy entered Yale at age 13, and was so devoted to his studies that he neglected exercise and sleep. He even limited himself to 12 mouthfuls of vegetables at meals, so as not to overeat and dull his mind. He went on to become a pastor and community leader. In 1795, he was elected president of Yale.

Soon he was debating upperclassmen on the subject: "Are the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament the Word of God?" In small numbers, students began considering Christianity, and within a couple of years there were about a dozen believers on campus.

After seven years of preaching, teaching and praying, Dwight saw a revival break out at Yale in which one-third of the student body was converted. This spiritual resurgence touched other colleges too: Harvard, Brown, Dartmouth, and many others. This "Second Great Awakening," provided the spiritual leadership American needed for the next generation.

The spirit of revival permeates Dwight's "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" which is based on a portion of Psalm 137. It is the oldest American hymn in continual use.


